APPLICATION IN ACTION

Restaurant owners understood the strength of fellowship, notwithstanding to keeping their business alive. However, not all restaurants survived the pandemic. The restaurant owners that survived, or even thrived, weren't the ones with the best food. It was the ones that were creative. Created outdoor environments, modified their menus, offered touchless menus like QR codes, etc. The ability to survive during adversity wasn't the result of leaders having dreams and visions. It was the result of leaders having the ability to have tactical and strategic vision and rapid application. If restaurant owners were to survive, they had to quickly and efficiently apply to action the vision that was in them to survive.

In John 21, Jesus is having dinner with Simon Peter and asks him 3 times if he loved Him. Jesus goes on to say that if Simon Peter loved him to apply that love to an action. "Feed my sheep". Another clear example in scripture is James 1:22. "But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves."

The scriptures teach us to not just say in deed but to apply what we say into action. It was actions from the ultimate leader in Jesus that separated Him

from the other Jewish leaders. Of course His speaking of the Kingdom was evident; however, it was supernatural actions of Jesus that drew attention to Him and compelled others to follow as well as made him a target to his enemies.

Great leadership requires Action. A study led by Delores Albarracin, posted on PubMed Central, showed behavior implications of people who operated with action goals versus inactive. The key finding of the study showed that individuals with action-oriented goals (i.e. predisposed to "doing something") show strong behavior responses than those oriented toward inaction. The study concluded that individuals with action goals lead to greater attention, intentionality and follow-through.

In the book, Talent is Not Enough, authored by John Maxwell, it is noted that 'Procrastination is the fertilizer that makes difficulties grow'. Individuals that proclaim but no action, have start but no finish, initial commencement but no follow thru, do not a great leader make. Great leadership requires action to application. As leaders, God have gifted us with ideas and visions. Further, we all have some gift of influence to recruit others and acquire



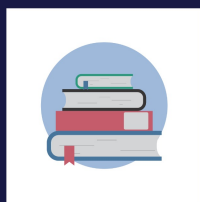
